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**SUBJECT:** Social Studies  
**COURSE TITLE:** AP Psychology  
**PREREQUISITES:** 11-12 Status

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**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** The Advanced Placement Psychology course is designed for students who wish to complete studies equivalent to an introductory college course in Psychology. The purpose of the course is to introduce students to the systematic and scientific study of the behavior and mental processes of human beings and selected animals. Major topics in the course include: history and approaches, biological bases of behavior, sensation and perception, states of consciousness, learning, and cognitions.

Indicators: Identify/recognize the historical development of the behavioral sciences and the changing nature of society.

Indicators: Compare differences in the behavior of individuals as examined from the interaction of heredity and experience.

Indicators: Evaluate the factors that shape personality and identity.  
Examine the process of socialization as it leads to individuals becoming functioning members of society.

**Benchmark: Examine the appropriate research procedures and skills of the behavioral scientist.**

Indicators: Diagram and practice a multistep procedure for carrying out experiments, taking measurements, or performing technical tasks.  
Analyze specific results based on explanations in text.  
Evaluate the hypotheses, data, analysis, and conclusions in psychology texts.



**Standard III. Analyze the interrelationship of people, places and environments to understand societies.**

**Benchmark: Analyze how social status, social groups, social change and social institutions influence individual and group behaviors.**

Indicators: Examine how technology is important in the spreading of ideas, values, and behaviors.  
Analyze the ways that family, gender, ethnicity and socioeconomic factors attribute to personal identity.

**Benchmark: Assess the process of how humans develop, learn, adapt to their environment and internalize their culture.**

Indicators: Examine the stages of physical, perceptual, and intellectual development that humans experience from infancy to old age.  
Evaluate the processes of cultural transmission and its affect on the individual.  
Assess the individual's personality and developments.

**Standard VI. Evaluate and synthesize information to communicate an understanding of knowledge relative to social science content.**

**Benchmark: Cite specific textual evidence to support analysis of primary and secondary sources, connecting insights gained from specific details to an understanding of the text as a whole.**

Indicators: Analyze the author's purpose in providing an explanation, describing a procedure, or discussing an experiment in text.  
Synthesize information from a range of sources.  
Evaluate the hypotheses, data, analysis, and conclusions of Psychology text.

**Benchmark: Determine the central ideas or information of a primary source; provide an accurate summary that makes clear the relationship among the key ideas.**

Indicators: Interpret the meanings of symbols, key terms, and other domain-specific words and phrases as they are used in a specific or technical context.  
Analyze how the text structures information or ideas into categories.  
Integrate and evaluate multiple sources of information presented in diverse formats and media.  
Analyze primary and secondary sources for research.

**Benchmark: Write informative/explanatory texts, focused on discipline-specific content.**

Indicators: Generate written responses to specific content.  
Summarize information about topics and apply information to specific questions.



**Benchmark: Conduct research projects and gather relevant information from multiple sources.**

Indicators: Write short and long term writing assignments that focus on reflection, revision and audience specific topics.  
Summarize information about topics and apply information to specific questions.
